

<u>More Pipes!</u> Another playing theater pipe organ comes on line within commuting distance for some of us, this time at the Grand Theater in East Greenville, PA, in the Upper Perkiomen Valley, south of Allentown. www.the**grandtheater**.org

It's a baby right now, a 2 manual 6 rank 1923 Marr & Colton instrument, but this is the Grand's first phase with another expansion to follow using a different and larger console with additional pipes et al. Phase II is expected to more than double it's size to a 3/12!The official debut is at their 2008 Christmas show (see below).
